

OUR HISTORY



Founded in 1942,
All Peoples has
served as a true
safe haven and
trusted place for
low-income
children, youth,
and families in
South Los Angeles
for 83 years.

Started prior to the Civil Rights Movement of the 1950's-60's, All Peoples was a revolutionary concept. As described in the organization's 2008 Strategic Plan: "All Peoples is a non-profit, non-sectarian community center located in the very spot where it was originally founded in 1942 -- in South Los Angeles. All Peoples has made incredible strides since it was first envisioned... as a place in the inner-city where people from all ethnicities, races, and religions could unite under one roof to share a vision for a stronger, more self-reliant community and to help turn the dreams of struggling local youth and adults into reality." At a time when de facto and de jure segregation were still an everyday reality in Los Angeles, the establishment of All Peoples, a multi-ethnic and multi-racial community center, was not just path-breaking, it was revolutionary. Launched by Pastor Dan Genung as a mission center of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), All Peoples evolved and was incorporated as a separate entity from the church in 1966. Originally called All Peoples Christian Center, the name was changed to All Peoples Community Center in 2012 to reflect the organization's non-sectarian service to a multicultural community.

Today, All Peoples provides comprehensive social and educational services to more than 6,600 people annually in its 20,000-square-foot center located in South LA's Vernon-Central neighborhood. Our flagship anti-poverty program, the FamilySource Center implements the evidence-based TwoGeneration model to move families out of poverty by simultaneously addressing youth academic achievement and family economic stability.








THE COMMUNITY WE SERVE

All Peoples serves over 6,600 low-income youth, adults, and seniors annually in South LA's Vernon-Central neighborhood (zip code 90011). This community faces some of the most severe socioeconomic challenges in the nation:



SOCIOECONOMIC CHALLENGES

- * The median family income is just \$47,126.
- * 55.2% of adults 25 and older lack a high school diploma or equivalent.
- * All students in local schools qualify for free and reduced-cost lunches.
- Nine Title 1 LAUSD high schools in our service area are designated "red" or "orange" performance on state indicators.
- The Los Angeles Police Department has identified 25 active gangs in our neighborhood.

27.5% Of families live below the federal poverty level.



HEALTH DISPARITIES

- * Over 25% of South Los Angeles residents are diabetic.
- * Over 58% of residents suffer from hypertension.



COMMUNITY OUTREACH

All Peoples deploys Outreach Workers throughout South Los Angeles to attend resource fairs, providing vital information and connecting youth and families with essential services. Our community is predominantly Latinx (89.9%) and Black (8.3%), with approximately 80% of residents speaking Spanish at home. Reflecting these demographics, All Peoples welcomes all residents while primarily serving low-income Latino families. Our internal data shows that 85% of individuals we serve are Latinx, 11% are Black, 1% are White, 1% are Multiracial, and 2% are unknown. 100% are low-income.









FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

The All Peoples Board of Directors diligently oversees the organization's fiscal health, with the Finance Committee reporting at every bi-monthly Board meeting. The Board officers annually review comprehensive financial reports, including our endowment and trust funds. Additionally, an independent external audit is conducted each year. All Peoples maintains organizational strength through diversified revenue sources, including:







POST-SECONDARY WORKSHOP SERIES

Our signature 5-week workshop series has been instrumental in preparing students and families for higher education journeys. Led by LAUSD PSA Evelyn Flores and FamilySource College Corner staff, these workshops covered essential topics:

- 1. Understanding the 4 Systems of Higher Education
- 2. Getting Started on Your College Journey
- 3. Navigating Financial Aid and FAFSA
- 4. Interpreting Your Award Letter
- **5. Supporting Your Child's Academic Success**

The workshops provided practical guidance on navigating college applications, understanding financial aid options, and developing skills for academic success. Participants benefited from expert advice and resources designed to make higher education more accessible.

In April 2019, All Peoples created the Geraldine Morgan Scholarship Fund in honor of Gerri's 99th birthday. This fund continues to assist young people who participate in the College Corner and Tomorrow's Leaders programs, providing a minimum of four \$1,000 scholarships annually. The Geraldine Morgan Scholarship Fund will continue in honor of her commitment to our youth and to celebrate Gerri's truly remarkable life and generous spirit.

30 students collectively saved \$3,000 during the workshop. Through the 2 to 1 match offered by ACFC and All Peoples, youth were able to save a total of \$9,000.

MEET EVELYN FLORES: LAUSD BRIDGING EDUCATION AND COMMUNITY

Evelyn Flores is the LAUSD Pupil Services and Attendance Counselor (PSA) at our FamilySource Center. She joined our team in summer 2023, as part of the FamilySource Partnership Program (FSPP), a collaboration between the City of Los Angeles Community Investment for Families Department (CIFD) and Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD).

Evelyn conducts socio-emotional and academic assessments that help link students and families to community and district resources to achieve academic and attendance success and promote college readiness. Additionally, she hosts a series of workshops to support and empower both student and parent engagement. Finally, she bridges resources from community organizations, the FamilySource Centers and the school district to support families.

From June 17 to July 19, All Peoples Community Center hosted the Urban Adventures Summer Day Camp, serving 100 low-income youth from South Los Angeles in grades 2-12. The program successfully addressed summer learning loss through its dual focus on academics and enrichment.

Each day began with academic assistance to reinforce school-year learning, followed by engaging activities including sports, arts, and hands-on science experiments. Weekly Friday field trips to destinations like the L.A. Zoo and Soak City transformed these outings into valuable learning experiences beyond the classroom.

The program also empowered 30 youth aged 14-24 who participated as Counselors in Training. These young leaders developed crucial

professional skills while serving as positive role models for younger participants. Through this comprehensive approach, Urban Adventures helped students maintain academic momentum while preparing them for future college and career success.

CAMP JOE IDE

From August 3 to August 8, All Peoples hosted Camp Joe Ide at the Loch Leven Camp and Conference Center in the San Bernardino Mountains. This American Camp Association-accredited program focused on holistic development—social, psychological, and physical—for 60 campers ages 8-12.

The camp was supported by 8 Counselors in Training (CITs), 11 dedicated volunteers, and 11 staff members who facilitated a diverse range of activities. Participants enjoyed swimming, archery, arts and crafts, hiking, and team



building exercises designed to encourage new physical skills, creative expression, and active group participation.

Camp Joe Ide created a nurturing environment where children could develop new abilities, engage in creative projects, and build meaningful relationships through collaborative activities.

SUMMER YOUTH EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

In partnership with the City of Los Angeles Economic Workforce Development Department, All Peoples coordinated the Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP), providing valuable paid work experience for 57 youth from disadvantaged backgrounds.

This comprehensive initiative offered participants a full spectrum of support services, including thorough intake assessments,

orientations, career planning guidance, financial education, and job placements. Each participant completed 120 hours of compensated work experience training, supplemented by Financial Literacy Workshops and Personal Enrichment Training sessions.

The SYEP program represents All Peoples' ongoing commitment to creating pathways to economic opportunity and professional development for young people in our community.

CARECEN PARTNERSHIP

EXPANDING IMMIGRATION SERVICES

All Peoples is proud to report significant achievements through our partnership with the Central American Resource Center (CARECEN) during the 2024 FamilySource Program Year. This collaboration has allowed us to provide vital immigration services to our South LA community with remarkable results.

WORKSHOP SERIES

Throughout the year, All Peoples and CARECEN hosted specialized workshops addressing various immigration needs:

U-Visa Workshop

Our informative workshop on U-Visas explained this special nonimmigrant status designed to protect individuals who have endured mental or physical abuse as victims of specific crimes, and who cooperate with law enforcement or government officials during criminal investigations or prosecutions.

Citizenship Workshop

We provided guidance on the naturalization process, helping community members understand eligibility requirements, application procedures, and resources available to support their path to citizenship.

Family-Based Petitions Workshop

On February 21, we hosted a workshop discussing ways that community members can petition for certain family members, relatives – or future relatives such as a fiancé(e), or a

prospective adopted child – to immigrate to the United States.

Asylum Workshop

This educational session provided critical legal information to family members of asylum seekers, helping them navigate the complex asylum process.

Immigration Relief Options Workshop

Our comprehensive workshop explored various pathways to legal status, with CARECEN representatives offering insights on eligibility criteria and application procedures. The final workshop for this fiscal year was held on June 12, focusing on Immigration Relief Options.

FINANCIAL LITERACY INITIATIVES TRANSFORM LIVES

COMPREHENSIVE FINANCIAL EDUCATION SERIES

Throughout the year, All Peoples partnered with Haven Neighborhood Services to offer a diverse financial education curriculum addressing critical needs.



- Preventing Identity Theft Workshop:
 Our final financial literacy workshop of the fiscal year equipped participants with strategies to protect their personal information.
- Managing Debt Workshop: Fifteen community members learned effective debt consolidation strategies, with opportunities for free one-on-one consultations following the session.
- Credit Report and Scores Workshop:
 Participants gained valuable insights into understanding and improving their credit.
- First-Time Homebuyer Workshops:
 From basics to certification, these popular sessions drew thirty-three community members eager to learn about the home buying process, qualification requirements, financing options, and preparation for homeownership. Our comprehensive 6-hour certification workshop included presentations from escrow title companies and appraisers, and reviewed purchase assistance programs for low-to-moderate income families.
- Tax Principles 101 Workshop:
 Twenty-eight community members attended this January event to learn about CalEITC, Federal EITC, Child Tax Credit, Education Credits, and ITIN information.





Our Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program continues to create significant financial impact for our community. From February through April 2024, All Peoples helped community members obtain \$761,708 in refunds through 417 Federal and State Tax Returns!

For the 2025 tax season, free tax services were available from January through May 2025 for taxpayers earning \$68,000 or less who file with either a Social Security Number or ITIN.

All Peoples is now an ITIN acceptance agent, expanding our ability to serve community members by helping with ITIN applications and connecting families with important tax benefits like the Child Tax Credit.

SANTA'S FINANCIAL WORKSHOP: HOLIDAY CHEER MEETS FINANCIAL WISDOM

On December 11, our FamilySource Center transformed holiday spirit into financial empowerment through **Santa's Financial Workshop**. Led by FSC Financial Coach Tabita Escobar Pepin, this festive session offered practical approaches to holiday budgeting while keeping long-term financial wellness in focus.

More than just tips, the workshop created a supportive environment where community members shared their financial goals and challenges. Participants left equipped with tools for both holiday spending and sustained financial health.

Special thanks to **AEG** for their generous donation of tickets that allowed three families of five to enjoy ice skating and a screening of Moana at L.A. Live—a wonderful incentive for workshop participation.

PATHWAYS TOWARD ECONOMIC STABILITY AND SELF-SUFFICIENCY

Through these targeted financial literacy initiatives, All Peoples continues to build pathways toward economic stability and self-sufficiency for South Los Angeles families.



FOOD SECURITY PROGRAM

THREE VITAL PROGRAMS

The All Peoples Food Security Department continues to address food insecurity through three vital programs that serve our community's diverse needs:

Supplemental Food Program (SFP) provides fresh fruits, vegetables, lean meats, protein, and other essential resources to 2,000 unduplicated residents weekly.

The Senior Food Delivery Program delivers nutritious groceries bi-weekly to 324 seniors ages 55 and over, ensuring our elderly community members have reliable access to healthy food.

Corazón de la Gente (Heart of the People) Community Farm, our 6,000 sq.ft. urban farm operated in partnership with American Friends Service Committee, features 22 raised beds

where families grow their own produce. One dedicated bed serves our Roots for Peace youth program, introducing the next generation to sustainable food practices.

OUR RESULTS:

- **2,000** unduplicated residents served weekly.
- **324** seniors served with bi-weekly grocery deliveries
- 22 raised family garden beds
- 90% of participants reported an increased consumption of fresh fruits and vegetables



TWO MILLION MEALS MILESTONE



In a landmark achievement for community food security, All Peoples Community Center, in partnership with Angel City FC (ACFC) and DoorDash, has proudly contributed to providing 2 MILLION MEALS to our community!

As part of this ongoing initiative,
DoorDash donates 1,000 meals to All

Department's distribution efforts,
helping us reach more families in need.

Collective Garden Workdays

In 2024, All Peoples' Corazón de la Gente Community Farm joined forces with RootDown LA to establish monthly collective garden workdays, fostering community involvement and sustainable urban agriculture.

The first collaborative workday took place on January 27 at Carver Middle School, where 50 volunteers assisted with garden projects and participated in an introductory meditation, concluding with RootDown LA's nutritious veggie-loaded chili. February 17 marked our first on-site collective garden workday at Corazón de la Gente. Community members worked together to repair and guide passion fruit vines on our altar, creating future shade for garden classes, nutrition workshops, and youth summer camp activities. Families brought children to plant in the "caja de niños" (kids' garden bed).

This successful event benefited from the expertise of Rootdown LA's garden team, Andres and Carlos, along with Ericka from LA Compost, who assisted with pruning, composting, and general maintenance. We express our appreciation to Crystal Gonzalez and American Friends Service Committee for providing lunch, and to all volunteers who dedicate one Saturday every month to maintaining our community farm.

COMMUNITY WORKSHOPS

Crochet 101 Workshop

Margarita Garcia, an active member of our Corazon de la Gente community garden, hosted a successful Crochet 101 Workshop attended by 23 participants. Under Margarita's guidance, attendees learned fundamental crocheting techniques and patterns, creating heart designs that symbolized the heart of our garden. The morning was filled with creativity, relaxation, and camaraderie, concluding with gifts of Ruda (Rue), a valued medicinal plant. During the workshop, Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) participant Orlando, alongside youth volunteer Gabriel, engaged younger children in a complementary planting activity.

Essential Oil Workshop

Our community values the medicinal properties of herbs, reflected in the garden's dedicated area for native medicinal plants. Blanca Lucio, an active garden member, led an Essential Oil Workshop for 32 community members, demonstrating how to transform garden-grown herbs into beneficial oils for external use. Participants learned about three herbs from our garden—rosemary, lavender, and various flowers—and their therapeutic applications for hair care, brow and lash maintenance, and joint discomfort relief. Each attendee created two oils to take home. While adults explored the benefits of essential oils, community member Brenda conducted a parallel painting activity where children decorated a kids kitchen set, ensuring engagement across all age groups.

MESH SPRING HEALTH FAIR

All Peoples, in collaboration with UCLA students from Medical Experience through Service in Healthcare (MESH), hosted a comprehensive Spring Health Fair for the community. MESH provided valuable education on nutrition, hypertension, and diabetes, along with free vision and blood pressure screenings. The successful event served 147 families, furthering our commitment to holistic community wellness.







FOUR DECADES OF SERVICE

A Legacy of Dedication and Impact

For over 80 years, All Peoples Community Center has been a pillar of support for low-income individuals, families, youth, and older adults throughout South and Southeast Los Angeles. Among our most impactful initiatives has been the **Retired and Senior Volunteer Program** (**RSVP**), a program of AmeriCorps Seniors hosted by All Peoples for more than 40 years.

RSVP has exemplified the power of community service by recruiting adults 55 years and older and connecting them with local non-profit organizations on the frontlines of addressing critical community needs. At its height, RSVP maintained over 200 active senior volunteers annually, contributing an impressive 28,085 hours of service each year across 16 South LA nonprofits and public agencies.

These dedicated volunteers served in diverse capacities: as academic tutors, food distribution workers, income tax preparers, student mentors, emergency preparedness educators, and gang prevention specialists. Their collective

efforts dramatically extended our reach, allowing us to touch more lives throughout our service areas.

Resilience During the Pandemic

When COVID-19 struck, our volunteer program faced unprecedented challenges. While many volunteer stations had to suspend activities, several RSVP volunteers demonstrated remarkable resilience and adaptability. We quickly implemented "Safer-at-Home" volunteer opportunities that allowed seniors to continue making vital contributions. Volunteers conducted wellness checks via telephone and video chats to identify potential victims of elder abuse, neglect, and exploitation. They assisted homebound seniors in accessing virtual activities and made follow-up calls to families seeking COVID-19 relief.

Perhaps most crucially, a dedicated group of RSVP volunteers maintained in-person service to support All Peoples' COVID-19 Emergency Food Distribution efforts, ensuring thousands of foodinsecure families received essential groceries. Throughout this challenging period, we maintained strict compliance with city-mandated health guidelines.


The Power of Reciprocity

One of RSVP's greatest strengths was its "rule of reciprocity" recruitment model. Many of our volunteers were former clients of All Peoples who had utilized our programming and resources, then chose to "pay it back" by volunteering their time and talents. This approach helped us recruit volunteers directly from the communities we serve, strengthening local connections and understanding. Beyond recruitment, we recognized that meaningful volunteer engagement creates mutual benefits. Research consistently shows that purposeful volunteering for older adults is associated with reduced depression symptoms, better self-reported health, fewer functional limitations, and lower mortality rates. Our RSVP volunteers did not just help others—they improved their own well-being in the process.

A Bittersweet Transition and Continued Service

It is with mixed emotions that we report the conclusion of the RSVP program at All Peoples Community Center as of March 31, 2024. This difficult decision was necessitated by financial limitations. As Executive Director Brandy Muñiz noted in her February 2024 letter: "The legacy of RSVP, its profound impact, and the unwavering dedication of all involved resonate deeply within our community. My heartfelt gratitude extends to every volunteer and partner site that generously contributed their time and services to the RSVP program."

While the formal RSVP program has concluded, we are pleased to report that many senior volunteers have transitioned to the All Peoples Volunteer Program, where they continue to offer their valuable time and expertise. A significant number now serve in the All Peoples Supplemental Food Program and Senior Food Delivery Program, ensuring that vulnerable community members maintain access to essential nutrition. The experience and dedication of these senior volunteers remain invaluable assets to our food security initiatives.



We extend special recognition to the visionary RSVP Directors who shaped the program throughout its history:

- **Geraldine Roberts**, the founding director who laid the foundation
- Mary Reynolds, who continued with unwavering dedication
- **Grace Kim**, who served several years following Mary's retirement
- **Teresa Yamamisaka**, who contributed 28 years to building the program
- Dale Evans, MSG, the final director who revitalized the program after the pandemic hiatus

While RSVP has concluded, All Peoples remains committed to our senior community members. We are determined to continue and strengthen our programming for older adults in South and Southeast Los Angeles, as evidenced by the seamless transition of many volunteers to our ongoing programs.

As we close this chapter of RSVP's remarkable history at All Peoples, we celebrate how its spirit lives on through our senior volunteers who continue to serve in the All Peoples Volunteer Program. The thousands of volunteer hours contributed, lives touched, and relationships formed over four decades have left an indelible mark on South and Southeast Los Angeles—a legacy that continues to thrive through our ongoing food security programs and other essential services. The commitment of our senior volunteers remains a powerful testament to the enduring impact of community engagement and service.


